CHANGING THE WORLD: Transformational Service in Schools - an Overview

Why Partner with Crossroads?

Our world is, undeniably, in need, and addressing global issues can no longer fall simply into the hands of a few strained agencies. The world, as a whole, must respond.

Schools and colleges are rightly placing increasing emphasis on service, citizenship and developing a global mindset. Additionally, as they seek to equip young people with the tools to navigate an increasingly complex world, there is a deeper understanding of the importance of transferable skills, emotional intelligence and values-driven approaches.

We are also seeing young people becoming more and more engaged in worldwide issues, and the desire to act, but little guidance in education about how we can enable them to become real change-makers. We need to be empowering our students to play their part in bringing about change for those living in poverty, in a way that is strategic, sustainable and that leads to transformational service.

At Crossroads we offer programmes that give unique insights into key challenges facing the world at this moment and empower students to help others directly as well as finding out how they may best impact this world for good.

We also appreciate the challenges that schools and colleges can face in ensuring that learning about these topics is delivered to an excellent standard, and that it is taken seriously by all stakeholders. We therefore offer professional development tools, helping shape the ways schools approach, engage in, and, ultimately, teach, planet-changing service.

We understand that every school is different. We would be happy to work with you in identifying the best ways that Crossroads can engage with your context.

Pupils & Students

We offer a range of activities suitable for all ages, from a half-day to a 4 day programme. There are also remote/ online options available for some activities.

TRANSFORMATION of HEARTS

To genuinely understand about how they can make a positive impact, individuals need to engage not only the head but also the heart. Crossroads' **Global X-perience Simulations** help students to gain insight into the lives of the people who receive our donated goods, strengthen their identity as a global citizen and move their hearts to serve the world we live in. HANDS taking ACTION

Students can make a tangible impact on the lives of those in need both in Hong Kong and around the world through volunteering on our site in Tuen Mun. You can read some real-life stories <u>here</u>. HEARTS and HANDS

Where learners experience both increasing empathy and make a practical difference: we call this 'X-perience & Serve'. This can be a one-day activity, but we can also offer multiple days to include a range of simulations or long term service projects. More details on page 8.

INSPIRATION

Crossroads is able to occasionally send speakers for school assemblies and other events, as well as for conferences. They can share about our broader work, as well as encourage students to 'be the change' they want to see in this world. More details on page 11.

Student Internships

Each year Crossroads welcomes two intakes of 30-40 students aged 17 and above for six-week internships that make a difference. Their work has an impact on communities in need here in Hong Kong and around the world.

Crossroads' interns take part in simulations and take action. They work alongside people from more than 20 nations, sharpening their skills through real-world work experience in an English-speaking environment. Roles available include: goods preparation for distribution, shipping, computing, our fair trade marketplace and café, communications, design, translation, administration, research, and running experiential simulation programmes.

We award students a certificate and a reference letter from Crossroads on completion of the internship programme, given at a celebratory party at the end of the internships. For many, though, the most valuable take-away can be new friendships, better workplace and language skills and a deeper understanding of how to help a world in need.

Many of our interns have made study and career choices based on their experiences here. Crossroads' interns are change-makers!

Professional Development

A key to effective global engagement starts with equipping educators and administrators with the resources they need to guide strategic and sustainable service for their students. To that end, Crossroads offers talks, professional development days, and staff-wide experiential programs, introducing the principles of best practice gleaned from working alongside schools around the world.

The overarching goal is to help these academic institutions master and internalize principles of best practice so that their service:

- may bring about justifiable, needed, and transformational change,
- will be sustainable, with a longevity of impact,
- will allow student to rightly discern world need and know how to use their own lives strategically to make a difference.

Our professional development sessions are typically 1 full day and run at our site in Tuen Mun, but we can bring them into schools. More details on page 10.

Ages 5+

We often run programmes for primary schools and can handle groups of various sizes. We'd be happy to discuss your preferences.

Village of Solutions

This simulation connects participants to the multi-faceted challenge of development, within the fictional village of Kalumbut. An aid agency has offered to find solutions to problems such as a local rubbish dump, lack of access to clean water, health issues and few kids attending the local school. In order to see these solutions bring change to the community as a whole, however, participants must demonstrate their ability to dialogue and work as a team.

Challenge of Water

This simulation brings to life the burden of gathering water shouldered by the 1.1 billion people who lack access to clean water, and invites participants to consider solutions to help address this issue.

Some Tonnes None

Participants must deal, first hand, with the unequal distribution of food on our planet. By the end of this exercise, they understand why hunger is, by far, the biggest killer in the world today.

Blind X-perience & Blindness Workshop

Blind X-perience: participants are led through an African village, in total darkness, by guides who are themselves blind. Without sight, participants will learn to navigate

sound, touch and scent, and are invited to experience the creativity and extraordinary capabilities of the visually impaired.

Blindness Workshop: This workshop will help participants explore life without sight, as they engage their other senses to discover the world around them. Through fun and interactive games, participants will learn how visually impaired people navigate daily life, including opportunities to learn some Braille!

Ages 12+

Fair Trade Coffee Game

Participants engage in the supply chain issues that perpetuate the gap between rich and poor. Stimulating discussion invites all to look for alternatives.

Blind X-perience & AIDS X-perience

Blind X-perience: participants are led through an African village, in total darkness, by guides who are themselves blind. Without sight, participants will learn to navigate using sound, touch and scent, and are invited to experience the creativity and extraordinary capabilities of the visually impaired.

AIDS X-perience: Participants walk through the life of individuals who have come into contact with HIV/AIDS and, at the end, are 'tested' to see if they are positive. They live, in a simulated way, the realities of war, poverty, poor medical care, abusive treatment and wrong life choices.

Ages 14+

Struggle for Survival

Participants try to earn enough to survive by making paper bags out of newspaper and home-made glue. They must earn enough to pay for rent, food, sanitation, medical needs and, if they are fortunate, education. Those that cannot make it end up in the hands of a loan shark. This simulation programme throws participants into the hopelessness and intricacy of the poverty web.

Ages 16+

Refugee Run

Participants face simulated attacks, mine fields where they may be 'injured', life in a refugee camp, hunger, illness, lack of education, corruption and uncertain shelter or safety. Participants may also be marched under guard, subjected to ambush and, ultimately, offered a chance of re-settlement where they must re-build their lives. The experience is co-developed with refugees, internally displaced persons and aid workers to create as realistic a scenario as possible and to target issues that need addressing by global leaders: ethnic conflict, weak legal infrastructure, corruption, disempowerment and frustration.

Due to the intense nature of this programme, we ask our participants to read and sign our Participation Agreement Form. We ask participants under 18 to have their forms signed by a parent or guardian.

Identity of Culture

The Identity of Culture, used as a part of Crossroads' humanitarian deployment training, provides a snap-shot into multiculturalism, diversity and cultural identity. The debrief offers key elements essential for effective engagement and service on the field.

Group Volunteering (Age 12+)

We love welcoming student groups to visit and help out in various activities around our site! A group service day can be rewarding and fun. It is an opportunity for both inspiration and perspiration: a chance to learn more about people in need and to make a real difference in their lives. We can give you more details on what you can do at Crossroads and the impact that your group can make.

To ensure that everyone has a meaningful and productive day, our suggested maximum group size is 24. Students will be split into smaller groups and work in different departments. We have more than 10 different departments dealing with goods donations here at Crossroads. Some of the tasks involved include:

- Sorting and packing donated goods: This is the main task in our processing departments (e.g. toys, household goods, clothing, and book departments). Groups can also run collection drives for wanted goods.
- **Renovations:** Includes activities such as painting, gardening, landscaping and maintenance.
- Heavy work: The work involved in our shipping and furniture departments can often include heavy work (e.g. preparing furniture for shipments, loading containers, and unloading trucks).

Please note: We take pictures for all our container loadings for publication and feedback to sponsors. Notify us if you do not want your pictures taken when participating in loading a container.

Although volunteering is free, if you are not doing a simulation, we ask for a refundable deposit of 1500HKD for groups of 10 or more.

X-perience & Serve (Age 14 +)

Many groups do what we call 'X-perience & Serve'. They spend part of their time in the Global X-perience programme and part in volunteering with Crossroads' needs. Not surprisingly, many find their community service much richer after a Global X-perience!

This can be a one-day activity or be extended for up to 4 days (Tuesday to Friday).

Programme Fees

The cost of a one-day Sim & Service programme ranges from 50 to 170 HKD per person, depending on the details. The four-day programme costs 500 HKD per person. Please contact us for a quotation.

Individual Students (Age 14+)

It can sometimes feel like the planet we're bequeathing to our children is broken beyond repair, but when we see the passion and capability of kids that work with Crossroads, it fills us with hope.

Individual students are welcome to come regularly and earn student service certificates. They will receive a service certificate for 70 hours' volunteering and an advanced service certificate for 140. These are helpful for CVs and can be accredited towards many community service programmes such as the 'Hong Kong Award for Young People'. Your hours can be completed at times most convenient for you.

They should sign up using our online form then we will contact them directly about our orientation tour and booking volunteering slots.

Professional Development

A key to effective student engagement starts with equipping educators and administrators to guide strategic and sustainable opportunities for their students.

Many schools aspire for their service to be more impactful for students, integrated into the curriculum, and transformational for the planet. Based on over two decades of engaging schools in service projects, Crossroads has identified key strategies and principles that can help guide strategic service. Through the Professional Development days, we offer strategies and explorative next steps to schools, to assist in seeing students become, not just 'global citizens', but 'world changers.'

The following is a suggested outline for a day's programme:

Morning Introduction

Lunch

Afternoon

Struggle for Survival Simulation Including discussion of Simulation experience Trends in Service Learning Small Group Discussions Full Group debrief

Groups can be divided according to grade, subject or management roles, as appropriate to your context.

Application topics include:

- How might this issue fit within your class, grade level, or subject department? How could this message be strategically built and aligned over the years?
- How might this experience impact your thinking on upcoming field experiences, class trips, or other educational travel?
- What obstacles stand in the way of more meaningful involvement in service?
- Where do service or being an active global citizen intersect with the school's mission, vision, goals, strategic plan, learner profile, ESLRs, WASC or accreditation plan, etc.?
- Does the school currently align staffing, budget, financial resources and time with the priorities of service?
- How can the school administration address any gaps in priority and support for service/equipping students to make a difference?

Duration of Stay: when working with a school outside Hong Kong, we typically stay for 1-3 working days, and often combine a Professional Development Day for the staff with programming for students as well.

When working with a school in Hong Kong, we can offer half day or full day programmes.

Costs: please do contact us for pricing, as it can depend on what you have in mind and on your context.

Student Supervision

- For simulations we request a minimum of one teacher per 10 participants.
- For volunteering we request a minimum of one teacher per 8 participants. Students usually work in small groups and we rely on teachers to assist in supervising students while they are working. A ratio of one teacher per 6 participants is preferred for students under 14.
- May we also ask that the supervising teachers stay with the group throughout the activities, and are familiar with the students in their group? We find that when teachers are actively involved in both service and the simulations with their students, the teacher/student relationship can be greatly enriched, and the students' experience is better.

Lunch Arrangements

- Please make your own arrangements for lunch.
- The Gold Coast Shopping Mall is located across the street, and offers a wide selection of restaurants.
- You can also book one of our rooms ahead of time and order your own lunch or bring packed lunches.

What to bring?

- Clothing: Please do make sure each participant is wearing weather-appropriate clothing with closed-toe shoes. To respect the various cultures represented on site, we ask that clothing is appropriate with *no short shorts/miniskirts or spaghetti straps*.
- Mosquito repellent
- Sun/Rain protection, as needed
- Personal water bottle, which can be refilled at various stations around the site
- Some money for purchasing products in the Fair Trade Café and Shop (optional)

Weather

- Wet weather: we encourage volunteers to bring wet weather gear if rain is forecast, but unless advised otherwise, you will be based indoors if weather is wet.
- Typhoon Policy: Crossroads remains open during T1 and T3 Typhoon signals. When it is likely that a T8 or above signal will be hoisted, we will close. Additionally, we remain open during an Amber and Red Rainstorm, but close when a Black Rainstorm signal is hoisted.

Simulation Programme Fees & Booking

- Contact us for quotes for your desired activities.
- Our aim is to educate, increase empathy and empower young people and we do not want cost to be a barrier to this.
- Please check out our <u>Booking FAQ's</u> for details on the terms and conditions of your booking (including our cancellation and weather policy, and what happens if your numbers change).

Volunteering Refundable Deposit

If you are not doing a simulation, we ask for a refundable deposit of 1500HKD for groups of 10 or more.

This will be forfeited if:

- your group cancels the booking less than 3 weeks before your service day.
- the size of your group changes by +/-5 or more people than what was originally booked.
- you make significant changes to the timing of your service day less than 3 weeks before your service day.

Additional Needs

Please advise us ahead of time if there are any participants in your group who

- have a food allergy, medical condition or other special needs that our facilitators should be aware of.
- have special educational needs, including participants with forms of autism, ADHD, etc. Please provide extra support for them as necessary.
- are wheelchair users, so that we can adapt the programme or volunteering tasks accordingly.

YOUNG PEOPLE CHANGE LIVES!

No matter if you look at Hong Kong or around the world, engaging the hearts and hands of young people changes lives for those struggling with poverty, conflicts or disabilities. Here are some ways that students have responded to their experiences at Crossroads.



SECONDARY STUDENT'S DRAMATIC X-PERIENCE

"I still vividly remember the beginning of the simulation... a group of 'militants' broke in, forcing us out of safety. At that moment I realised what I had signed up for. Frankly, it was terrifying."

Gingin, a secondary student, undertook our simulation of the refugee crisis and, afterwards, told us how she found it. "Throughout the entire experience, the only thought I had in my head was: How are millions of people surviving through this living hell?"

Gingin was impacted so deeply by the 'Refugee Run' that she decided to channel her experience into a theatrical script. She called it, poignantly, 'Home'. It tells of a young girl, Ola, who leaves her family in search of safety. "The plot reveals the raw pain of sacrifice," says Gingin; "of restarting life and the loss that refugees face in the process."

Undertaking the Refugee Run at Crossroads helped Gingin access the emotion and empathy with which she infused her play. "The authenticity of the simulation played a key role," she says. "It allowed me to enrich my writing with personal experiences."

'Home' was performed by the Hong Kong Youth Arts Foundation: an extraordinary achievement for Gingin. Her classmates from Renaissance College were likewise moved to help and focussed on producing educational packs for us to use in our refugee work. We are deeply impressed by the difference students can make when they care about world issues. Gingin and her colleagues are proof

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FROM HONG KONG TO NEPAL RESPONDING TO THE STRUGGLE FOR SURVIVAL

When Pankaj from Nepal took part in our Struggle for Survival X-perience back in 2010 with his university, he wasn't expecting to learn much. "I remember telling myself this is for people who have lived all their life in a devel oped country. As I had seen poverty every day, I assumed I could empathise. I could not have been more wrong."

The x-perience began to impact Pankaj, when, along with the group, he took on the persona of a slum-dweller. He had no option but to force his 'children' to work, and was confronted with the decision to 'sell' those children to survive. By the end, his empathy had deepened and, he said, his

Pankaj has since returned to his home country of Nepal. "I understood poverty as a web that traps one," he says. "So I co-founded a start-up NGO, the Institute for Suitable Action for Prosperity (ISAP), working to economically empower resource-poor people through entrepreneurship and a market based approach. We aim to provide stepping stones to help them climb out of poverty."

Crossroads is not the only reason Pankaj begun his non-profit work, but he says it "did provide me the impetus to do more and guide me how I do work.
